

Guess Who? - Future Jobs Edition

Instructions


Number of Players – 2


- 1. Have each person write down one of the careers on a sheet of paper. Do not let your opponent see what you wrote.
- 2. Players alternate turns asking "yes" or "no" questions. For example, you may ask: "Does your person work outdoors? Your opponent must then answer either "yes" or "no."
- 3. To win the game, you have to correctly guess the career on your opponent's card by asking one question per turn, and eliminating any careers that don't fit the mystery career's description.
- 4. When you're ready to guess what the mystery career is, make your guess on your turn, instead of asking a question. For example, "your career is a mechanical engineer." Your opponent must then tell you whether or not your guess is correct. If your guess is right, you win the game! If it's wrong, you lose.



























Mock Interview

- 1. What does success in a career mean to you?
- 2. Describe a time you felt successful. What did you succeed in doing? How did you prepare for it?
- 3. When thinking of your future, are there any skills you would like to develop or strengthen? What can you do to make this happen?
- 4. What type of communication skills do you think employers value most in job candidates?

Making a Good First Impression

- 5. What does it mean to make a good first impression?
- 6. What would be the first things someone would notice about you in an interview?
- 7. Have you ever made a bad first impression—in school, sports, or some other activity? What impression do you think you made, and how did that happen?
- 8. Think about your social media identity—the digital version of you. What does it say about you? Is that how you'd want a potential employer to know you? Why or why not?
- 9. What changes could you make to your social media presence to improve the first impression it gives?



Dressing Well for Work or an Interview

- 10. How is clothing related to communication? What kinds of things can clothes say about the wearer?
- 11. What messages do you think wearing ripped, stained, smelly, distracting, or offensive clothing sends to others?
- 12. Why is it important that you "feel like you" when dressing for the workplace?
- 13. Choose a career field or workplace that interests you. Where would you start to learn what is and isn't appropriate to wear for work? Do you know any "do's" and "don'ts" already?

Listening in the Workplace

- 14. Name three to four jobs or careers (besides the medical field) in which listening really matters. Why is it so important for each one? What are some potential risks of not listening carefully enough?
- 15. How do you feel when you know a person you're talking with isn't listening to what you're saying? In your experience, what is the most common sign of this?
- 16. How do you know when you're doing a good job listening to others?
- 17. Do you have any listening habit(s) that could be improved? How could you do this?
